EMERGENCY RESOURCES AND GRANTS FOR ARTISTS

The following are a selection of information resources and grants available to assist artists during periods of personal or professional emergency, as well as searchable online databases of emergency grants. Note: the term “emergency grant” is sometimes used to indicate a grant available for artists with an unanticipated opportunity or in need of last minute funding for a project. Such resources are not covered here.

NYC ARTS & CULTURE EMERGENCY INFORMATION NETWORK

CultureAID (Culture Active in Disasters)

CultureAID (Culture Active in Disasters) is a collaborative network of stakeholders and service providers committed to strengthening New York City’s cultural community – including artists and organizations – before, during, and after disasters through an organized communications system as well as coordinated activities and services to the field. CultureAID was founded in 2013 through a collaborative working process spearheaded by the NYC Department of Cultural Affairs (DCLA) and FEMA’s Sandy Recover Office, with a group of cultural service organizations whose missions broadly serve the entire City of New York. Together, the group now serves as CultureAID’s Steering Committee, and will work to maintain relationships with the national arts sector and emergency management agencies, and provide resources and updated disaster-related information to the field.
